Since 1843, B'nai B'rith International has been dedicated to improving the quality of life for people around the globe. A constant source of innovation and charity for populations around the world, B'nai B'rith has founded hospitals, orphanages and senior housing communities; and launched disaster relief campaigns, child safety initiatives, tolerance education programs and countless other initiatives in the public interest. Today, B'nai B'rith serves individuals and communities in more than 50 countries on six continents.

Currently, B'nai B'rith International is a national and global leader in helping communities in crisis; providing senior housing and advocacy on vital issues concerning seniors and their families; promoting diversity and tolerance education; and advocating for Israel. The notion of volunteers doing good work in their communities and beyond is the mission that has driven our organization since 1843. Over the course of three centuries, the B'nai B'rith network has evolved, grown and adapted with the changing times, but our core values and mission of improving the lives of those around the world remain the same.

Through the combined efforts of dedicated volunteer leaders and professional staff, B'nai B'rith improves the quality of life for those around the country and across the globe through our action on human rights and public policy, community service, Israel advocacy and senior services and housing. Highlights from Our History

1843:

Global Affairs & Public Policy

B'nai B'rith was present at the founding of the United Nations in San Francisco in 1945, and has taken an active role as an NGO (non-governmental organization) at U.N. venues around the globe ever since. In addition, B'nai B'rith continues to be a vocal advocate for human dignity at many other international organizations, with a wide range of foreign governments and through a diverse spectrum of faith-based and ethnic groups.

B'nai B'rith's involvement in international affairs dates to the 1850s, when the organization spoke out against Switzerland's anti-Semitic treatment of its Jewish residents. As we have throughout our history, B'nai B'rith continues to combat the scourge of anti-Semitism and other forms of discrimination still present today. B'nai B'rith International is dedicated to sounding the alarm about anti-Semitism and marshaling efforts to combat and eradicate, wherever possible, this phenomenon.


B'nai B'rith also plays an active role in cultivating religious tolerance and international cooperation. This is done through high-level meetings with top government leaders, as well as through grassroots education projects such as the Diverse Minds Youth Writing Challenge, where high school students write and illustrate children's books about tolerance and diversity.

Today, no other Jewish organization can point to a longer, more all-encompassing history of service to Jews and all people around the world. B'nai B'rith International continues to bring a strong voice to humanitarian, international and domestic policy.

INTERNATIONAL ADVOCACY

B'nai B'rith International has had NGO status at the United Nations since the world body's founding conference. Today, B'nai B'rith continues to represent the Jewish people at U.N. hubs around the globe, including those in New York, Geneva and Paris.

DIVERSE MINDS YOUTH WRITING CHALLENGE

In addition to working in the political sphere to advocate for tolerance, B'nai B'rith also encourages grassroots programming to bring the message of tolerance to the next generation. The Diverse Minds Youth Writing Challenge is a scholarship competition that asks high school students to write and illustrate children's books based on a topic of tolerance and diversity. Over the last seven years, B'nai B'rith has published 41 original children's books and awarded more than \$337,000 in college scholarships and grants. Thousands of these published books have also been donated to public schools, libraries and Boys & Girls Clubs around the country.

Community Service

B'nai B'rith's community service efforts date back to the mid-1800s, when victims of a Baltimore, Maryland, flood were the first recipients of B'nai B'rith disaster relief funds. In 1865, B'nai B'rith funded its first international assistance project, helping victims of a cholera epidemic in what was then Palestine.

The roots of those first relief campaigns continue to grow today as B'nai B'rith urgently responds when natural and man-made disasters occur or when communities are in need in the United States or around the globe. B'nai B'rith helps from the outset and remains to rebuild and offer assistance, even after first responders have left the scene. From Sri Lanka to New Orleans, and from Haiti to Japan, B'nai B'rith seeks to fill the needs that might otherwise be overlooked.

In addition to aiding communities in crisis, or places devastated by disaster, B'nai B'rith volunteers are active in their local communities with a wide variety of local projects. These range from distributing food to shelters and schools to feed the hungry, bringing joy and gifts to children in the hospital, educating communities on keeping their children safe and much more.

DISASTER RELIEF

Working independently or in partnership with other nonprofit organizations, B'nai B'rith is there in the immediate aftermath of a disaster and stays to help when most others have moved on. Pictured here is B'nai B'rith's immediate response, in partnership with IsraAID (the Israel Forum for International Humanitarian Aid), to bring rescue, medical and logistics teams to Port-Au-Prince following the devastating 2010 earthquake in Haiti.



HUMANITARIAN AID

B'nai B'rith has brought tens of millions of dollars worth of supplies, medicine and relief efforts to communities in need throughout Latin America, Cuba and Africa. Pictured here is a mission to aid Sudanese refugees in the ongoing humanitarian crisis.



SMARTER KIDS-SAFER KIDS

B'nai B'rith's "Smarter Kids-Safer Kids" program, distributed free—both in print and online—includes information for parents, teachers and law enforcement about online security, what to do when a child is alone, what to do if a child is lost or when he or she is faced with an improper situation. There are role-playing exercises and guided discussions that parents and guardians can use to teach their children about how to stay safe. "Smarter Kids-Safer Kids" is used by communities around the nation and is available in English and Spanish.







FOOD DISTRIBUTION

Advocating for Israel

Starting in 1888, B'nai B'rith began its presence in what was then Palestine, with the creation of the first Jerusalem Lodge. The lodge began laying the foundation for the cultural, economic and social rebirth of the Jewish nation and also served as a pivotal force in the founding of the State of Israel. Another milestone was reached in 1980, with the establishment of the B'nai B'rith World Center in Jerusalem.

The World Center is our connection to a wide range of Israeli governmental, academic and cultural institutions. The center promotes strong Israel-Diaspora relations. It is the voice of the B'nai B'rith community to the Israeli government, national institutions and the NGO community in Israel. The World Center also sponsors community service work, cultural programs and interchange.

B'nai B'rith is a staunch supporter and defender of Israel at the United Nations and its affiliated agencies, in world capitals and at a variety of international organizations. Domestically, we advance our Middle East priorities by communicating regularly with the White House, Congress and State Department to promote the Jewish community's interests in the region. Internationally, B'nai B'rith encourages other governments to build stronger bilateral and regional ties with Israel. We provide analysis and expertise on current Middle East issues, and we facilitate Israel's efforts to provide humanitarian assistance abroad. As a founding member of IsraAid (the Israel Forum for International Humanitarian Aid), B'nai B'rith also works with many other Israeli relief organizations to bring humanitarian aid to communities around the globe.

GLOBAL LEADERSHIP

B'nai B'rith regularly meets with heads of state, such as German Chancellor Angela Merkel (center), to illuminate the unjust treatment Israel receives in world venues. We work together with world leaders to recognize and combat anti-Semitism within their own populations.





GLOBAL ADVOCACY

B'nai B'rith leaders from the United States, Canada and several European countries meet in Geneva at the United Nations Human Rights Council to advocate on behalf of Israel and the global Jewish community.

ISRAEL EMERGENCY FUND

In 2012, B'nai B'rith International opened its Israel Emergency Fund to aid victims of the Hamas rocket and mortar attacks from Gaza. The funds raised assist Israeli residents in the areas struck by the terror attacks and also provide for personal needs of soldiers from the Israel Defense Forces serving in that region.



Senior Advocacy and Housing

B'nai B'rith International is the largest national Jewish sponsor of federally subsidized housing for the elderly in the United States, with 42 buildings in 26 communities. For more than 40 years, B'nai B'rith has worked in partnership with the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to make rental apartments available for senior citizens with limited incomes.

B'nai B'rith senior housing currently serves more than 8,000 low-income seniors and is open to all qualified individuals as defined by HUD, without regard to race, color, religion, sex, handicap or national origin. In addition, B'nai B'rith has international senior housing options in five countries around the world.

With our unparalleled expertise in protecting seniors and advocating on aging issues, we serve as a respected voice on a wide variety of issues affecting seniors. Working with our members and supporters throughout the United States, our senior advocacy initiative advances B'nai B'rith's agenda on a range of seniors' issues to policymakers in Washington, D.C., and across the country. Such issues include Social Security, aging in place, access to quality health care, Medicare, funding for the aging services network and minimum wage.

SENIOR HOUSING

The lack of an adequate supply of safe, affordable housing for low-income persons is a serious problem in the United States. As the largest national Jewish sponsor of low-income housing for seniors in the country and a recognized expert on affordable housing, we continue to advocate for increased resources for HUD-assisted senior housing.





HOUSING EXPERTISE

B'nai B'rith senior housing is committed to promoting and maintaining the highest level of service and expertise. Each year, management professionals and members of the individual boards of directors of the B'nai B'rith housing units meet to share best practices. In addition, management professionals and service coordinators get together on a yearly basis to ensure they are up to date on the latest HUD guidelines. Every other year, housing residents who represent their local resident councils meet at the B'nai B'rith Perlman Camp to share experiences and learn about programs at other housing properties.

SENIOR ADVOCACY

Lifelong access to quality, affordable housing and health care is crucial to ensure a healthy older population. Through our long-standing partnership with HUD, B'nai B'rith works with federal agencies to strengthen housing programs for low-income seniors as well as to advocate for improved access to better health care.
