1917 During World War I, B'nai B'rith raises \$1 million to aid American troops and purchases this ambulance for the Red Cross in France.



1947 B'nai B'rith meets with President Harry S. Truman to advocate for the creation of the State of Israel.



2005 B'nai B'rith provides more than \$1.1 million in aid to assist the victims of Hurricane Katrina.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

In 1865, B'nai B'rith funded its first international assistance project, helping victims of a cholera epidemic in what was then Palestine.

The roots of those first relief campaigns continue to grow today as B'nai B'rith urgently responds when natural and man-made disasters occur or when communities are in need in the United States or around the globe.

In addition to aiding communities in crisis, or places devastated by disaster, B'nai B'rith volunteers are active in their local communities with a wide variety of local projects. These range from distributing food to shelters and schools to feed the hungry, bringing joy and gifts to children in the hospital, educating communities on keeping their children safe and much more.

HUMAN RIGHTS & PUBLIC POLICY

B'nai B'rith was present at the founding of the United Nations in San Francisco in 1945, and has taken an active role as an NGO (non-governmental organization) at U.N. venues around the globe ever since. In addition, B'nai B'rith continues to be a vocal advocate for human rights at many other international organizations, with a wide range of foreign governments and through a diverse spectrum of faith-based and ethnic groups.



INTERCOMMUNAL AFFAIRS

This spring, in partnership with The Leona M. and Harry B. Helmsley Charitable Trust, B'nai B'rith sponsored three missions to Israel for members of the European Parliament and United Nations Diplomats. The goal of these missions are to introduce emerging world leaders to Israel. Itineraries included meetings with business and political leaders, trips to a wide variety of religious holy sites and forums on Middle East foreign affairs.

INTERNATIONAL ADVOCACY

B'nai B'rith International has had NGO status at the United Nations since the world body's founding conference. Today, B'nai B'rith continues to represent humanitarian issues at UN offices around the globe, including those in New York, Geneva, and Paris. SENIOR HOUSING & ADVOCACY

B'nai B'rith International is the largest national Jewish sponsor of federally subsidized housing for the elderly in the United States, with 42 buildings in 26 communities. For more than 40 years, B'nai B'rith has worked in partnership with the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to make rental apartments available for senior citizens with limited incomes.

SENIOR ADVOCACY

Lifelong access to quality, affordable housing and healthcare is crucial to ensure a healthy older population. Through our long-standing partnership with HUD, B'nai B'rith works with federal agencies to strengthen housing programs for low-income seniors as well as to advocate for improved access to better healthcare.





FOOD DISTRIBUTION

Project H.O.P.E. (Help Our People Everywhere) is one of B'nai B'rith's many community action projects where our volunteers collect and distribute food packages to the poor and elderly during holidays.

Us Humans, Written and Illustrated by Vivian Velez, was created as part of the B'nai B'rith International Diverse Minds Writing Challenge for the New York City Region.

The Diverse Minds Writing Challenge is B'nai B'rith's signature tolerance education program that asks high school students to write and illustrate a children's book that recognizes diversity or tells a story of tolerance. Students are required to think about how inclusion can improve our world, and then create innovative ways to teach these ideas to elementary-aged children through a book. Executed through public and private high schools, the initiative aims to promote a greater understanding of different cultures, lifestyles and attitudes among students of all ages.



Book submissions were reviewed by a local judging panel comprised of business leaders, educators, non-profit community leaders and local officials. Scholarship prizes in the amounts of \$5,000, \$2,000 and \$1,000 are awarded to the first, second and third



place winners, and the first-place winning book is professionally published and donated to elementary schools, libraries and literacy organizations.

This year the Diverse Minds Writing Challenge is celebrating its 12th Anniversary. Since its inception in 2006, B'nai B'rith has published 42



original children's books, in two different languages (English and Spanish), awarded more than \$340,000 in college scholarships and grants and donated more than 45,000 books to public schools, libraries and community organizations across the country.
